Reflection on the **NERGC** Genealogy Society Fair

As with so many projects there are always last minute glitches and the *New England Regional Genealogical Conference's Society Fair* held on Thursday evening November 6, 2003, at the Seacoast Resort & Conference Center in Falmouth, Massachusetts, was no exception. Dale Mower from Bangor, Jack and Nancy Battick from Dover-Foxcroft, and Cheryl Patten and helper husband, Bruce, from Smithfield had agreed to represent MGS and all the various chapters, as well as MOCA - the Maine Old Cemetery Association - at that Fair. We had planned what we hoped would be eye-catching visual displays and would need quite a bit of time to get everything all set up. The Society Fair is an opportunity for various nonprofit groups to have displays and present information about their group/society for several hours on the first evening of the conference. There is no charge to have a presentation and what is especially nice is that the Society Fair is held before the vendor area opens, so it is unopposed by any other sessions or events that would tend to draw folks to other venues. It had been a number of years since MGS had participated in this session and it was exciting to be able to have so many currently active chapters who had prepared brochures and materials for handouts/display. This was going to be a great opportunity for MGS and for the chapters.

The Fair was to be from 5:00 PM until 7:30 PM (first glitch since the information we received initially was that the Fair was for two hours) and we were to be ready and in attendance 30 minutes before that. No problem. The first sessions of the conference were to begin at 1:30 and we planned to set up most things before that first session. Second glitch - the folks at Seacoast Resort were still working in the area setting up tables and signs and no one was allowed into the area until they were done. We brought in our materials and waited - I wish I could say patiently - but can't. It became obvious that some of us would miss the first session at 1:30 if we wanted to set up first. Eventually the area opened, we worked diligently to set up all the displays and handouts, and departed to our respective second session (5 choices for the time slot of 2:45 - 3:45). Third glitch - attending the third session of the day (five presentations from 4:00 until 5:00) would not allow us to be at the Fair by 4:30 as required. Helper husband to the rescue. Bruce wasn't registered for the conference so he was able to arrive in time to set up the lap top and uncover and reset the rest of the displays and we were in business.

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The Counties of Maine—Part I

YORK

Organized 20 Nov 1652

County Seat: Alfred

Originally called New Somersetshire, it extended from the Piscataqua River to the Kennebec in 1638. In 1639 the name of the Province was changed to Maine and in 1658 when Massachusetts assumed her jurisdiction over the territory to the western line of North Yarmouth, the name was changed to Yorkshire and the territory was extended by charter in 1691 over what is now the whole State of Maine. The territory comprising York County contained the present state from 1691 until 1760 when the Counties of Cumberland and Lincoln were taken from it and separately incorporated.

Records at the York County Courthouse in Alfred include all existing records of the entire state prior to 1760; as well as records for sections of the present-day Oxford County until 1805. Many of the records have been published as York Deeds.

LINCOLN

Organized 01 Nov 1760

County Seat: Wiscasset

Incorporated from York County. Washington and Hancock formed from Lincoln in 1789; Kennebec 1799; Waldo 1827; Androscoggin and Sagadahoc in 1854; and half of Knox in 1860.

Lincoln County records are located in Wiscasset. Records prior to 1760 are in York County. The Lincoln County records includes parts of present-day Androscoggin and Franklin counties and records of all others (except York, Cumberland and Oxford) for the 1760-1789 period, as well as Kennebec records to 1799.

CUMBERLAND

Organized 01 Nov 1760

County Seat: Portland

Incorporated from York County. Originally contained Androscoggin and Franklin and parts of Oxford, Kennebec and Somerset.

Cumberland County records are located in Portland. Records prior to 1760 are in York County. Cumberland County records include portions of present-day Oxford and Androscoggin Counties.

HANCOCK

Organized 25 Jun 1789

County Seat: Ellsworth

Incorporated June 25, 1789 from Lincoln County. Portions taken in 1816 to form Penobscot County and in 1827 to form Waldo.

Records between 1760 and 1789 are in Lincoln County; and before 1760 they are in York County. Records in Ellsworth also contain those relating to present-day Penobscot and Waldo Counties, and parts of Knox and Aroostook Counties) prior to the organization of those counties.

LINEAGE LINKS
