He was born in 1844, and may have been born, or lived in the Exeter area prior to 1870 when he is found in California. ### DELANO

I have some very limited information (and I am very new at this) but I thought the society members might be able to help. Thank you, in advance, for whatever assistance you might be able to provide.

Here is what I do know:

1. My great-great grandfather, John Delano, was born on October 13, 1845, in Bangor, Maine.
2. At the age of 13 (approx. 1858) he moved with his parents (names unknown) and five brothers (Hatsil, Silas) to Wisconsin.
3. I know other Delano's of the same approximate age were in Bangor at that time -- William F. and Cephres -- as they are buried in a cemetery there. However I do not know their relationship to John. If you know of any remaining Delano's in the area ( I noted cemetery entries as late as the 1990s) who are familiar with the Delano family history, I would appreciate you putting me in contact with them.

I also have a note that said that my great-great grandfather served with his father and brother, Hatsil, in the Civil War. In checking the Wisconsin Volunteer rosters for Delano's out of Rantoul, Wisconsin (where I am told they settled) I find that the only three Delano volunteers were John, Hatsil and Abram. Therefore, I am led to believe that my great-great-great grandfathers' name was probably Abram Delano if that will be of any help.

## GenBytes by Dale Mower

Fall is coming; it's time to start pruning your list of bookmarks (aka favorites) in your web browser. If you're like me, you keep adding websites to your favorites list in the expectation you'll revisit the site often or at a later date. Before you know it your list of favorites has grown unwieldy and just plan out of control. I use Internet Explorer for my web browsing, although others are similar, they allow for setting up folders to help you organize - just like a filing cabinet of yore. So you can place all your bookmarks for Maine related sites in one folder, ethnic related sites in another and perhaps set up folders for your major surnames. Not fun, but if it can eliminate frustration trying to find a link when you are hot on the trail of an elusive ancestor - it's time well spent!

Now for a search tip. I occasionally hear complaints about the search engine at Ancestry.com. It's not just Ancestry.com; some other sites have some funky internal search engines. Well, no search engine is perfect or else we wouldn't have to work so hard to narrow down search results. Sometimes, we like the comfort of Google. Well, the thing is you can use Google for searching within specific sites - just add site: to your search followed immediately by the site you want to search (no spaces). For example: you might search Mower Maine site:rootsweb.com or Estabrook Hodgdon site:familysearch.org. Not all sites (or all features within a site) are set up for this, so it's not 100%. But you might want to play with it.

My other suggestion is more fun. I was turned onto this site by listening to a recent podcast by the Genealogy Guys. The site is [www.genealogue.com](http://www.genealogue.com). It's interesting; its tagline is "Genealogy News You Can't Possibly Use." It has some fun and entertaining genealogical news articles, a slew of top 10 lists dealing with genealogy if you're a David Letterman wannabe, and a genealogy blog finder. But it also has some fun challenge questions for you to try to solve using internet resources. A recent one being: The actress who played "Auntie Em" in 1939's *The Wizard of Oz* was born aboard a ship. What was the name of the ship, and who was the captain? Interesting, it gives you an opportunity to taste your research skills and see what some fellow researchers come up with. Educational, but fun.
