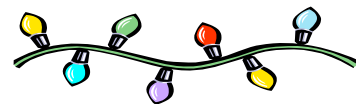

## GenBytes by Dale Mower

With many of our members living outside of the immediate area, I am going to use this column to summarize the Internet trip we took at the October meeting. My talk "eGenealogy:2008" explored a wide variety of websites - some directly genealogical, some not so much - as well as discussing tips and tricks of searching.

We started where we left off last year - in New Brunswick. For those with ancestry from that province, we viewed "First Families of New Brunswick" at the New Brunswick Genealogical Society's site ([www.nbgs.ca/firstfamilies.html](http://www.nbgs.ca/firstfamilies.html)). This is a great project which summarizes genealogical info and includes sources available at the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick. We looked at the Vital Records and Cemetery Databases which can be accessed from the Archives' site ([archives.gnb.ca](http://archives.gnb.ca)).

We did a visit of Early Vital Records of Massachusetts ([www.ma-vitalrecords.org](http://www.ma-vitalrecords.org)), a database of the popular Vital Records to 1850 series. This is an ongoing project, so not all town's records are available at this time. Searchable by town or surname, many have links to digital images from the books.

We then stopped at FamilySearch.org. An old standby for researchers, we peeked around their new prototype for searching indexed records ([pilot.familysearch.org](http://pilot.familysearch.org)). You may recall the monumental project they are undertaking to digitize and index the millions of records they have. New types of records are being added as indexing is completed. Search hits contain links to the image of the original document. This is one site that you need to keep any eye on as it has the potential to be the premier site for the diversity and quantity of records that will be available on a non-subscription website.

We then went morbid. Visiting the Penobscot County USGenWeb site ([www.rootsweb.ancestry.com/~mepenobs/mepenobs.htm](http://www.rootsweb.ancestry.com/~mepenobs/mepenobs.htm)). The site has recently added inscription lists from a couple Penobscot County cemeteries: Millinocket Cemetery ([www.penobscotcountymegen.info/Milli\\_cemetery.htm](http://www.penobscotcountymegen.info/Milli_cemetery.htm)) and Mattawamkeag Cemeteries at ([www.penobscotcountymegen.info/mattawamkeag.htm](http://www.penobscotcountymegen.info/mattawamkeag.htm)). We also visited the Maine Catholic Cemeteries Database ([www.portlanddioceses.net/genealogy\\_main.php](http://www.portlanddioceses.net/genealogy_main.php)) which contains a searchable database for Mt. Pleasant Catholic Cemetery here in Bangor, among others. Then it was off to Find-A-Grave ([www.findagrave.com](http://www.findagrave.com)). We had made a stop here last year, but we looked at how to request a gravestone photo.

No discussion of cemetery research is complete without also thinking "Obituaries". So it was off to Bangor Daily News ([www.bangornews.com](http://www.bangornews.com)) where you can search not only their newspaper's obituaries, but nationally as well.

We then transitioned to search engines. We're all familiar with Google and Yahoo, but we visited Search Me ([www.searchme.com](http://www.searchme.com)) which returns hits as images of the pages they are on, rather than a list format. This can be beneficial as you might recognize a site you have already visited. It can be kind of fun. We also explored a Genealogy-Specific search engine ([www.liveroots.com](http://www.liveroots.com)). My jury is still out on this one, but I toss it out as another resource.

Then it was back to the future. We looked at the Way Back Machine ([www.archive.org](http://www.archive.org)), a site where you can enter a website address and see previous versions of the website. Particularly useful if you have a hit from a search that you really want to see, but the link states that the site is no longer available. Try this website to see if an archived copy exists.

Then it was a quick review of generating .pdf files for free. A simple process and I recommended looking at Primo PDF ([www.primopdf.com](http://www.primopdf.com)), a quick program download sets a .pdf writer up as a printer. When you want to save a webpage or other document as a .pdf, you simply go to print, select the .pdf writer as your printer, select where you want the .pdf file saved on your computer and hit ok. Very simple and a great way to capture website info for future review (remember as discussed in the last paragraph, websites come and go and typically constantly change).

We ended with a very brief mention of mailing lists accessible through [www.rootsweb.com](http://www.rootsweb.com) and a very quick visit to a social genealogy site ([www.werelate.org](http://www.werelate.org)).

Darn, time was out and the library was ready to close. So until next fall, happy surfing. And remember, if you find a really unique website, I'd love to hear about it. You can email me at [dale@mower-family.com](mailto:dale@mower-family.com).
